Minimum wage is increasing on 1 April

The minimum wage rates will increase from 1 April 2024. The adult minimum wage will go up from \$22.70 to \$23.15 per hour, and the starting-out and training minimum wages will go up from \$18.16 to \$18.52 per hour. All rates are before tax and any lawful deductions, for example, PAYE tax, student loan repayments and child support.
